- In academic year (AY) 2021-22, nearly 189,000 U.S. college students studied abroad for credit



In 2021/22, the total number of U.S. students who studied abroad for academic credit **increased to 188,753 students,** a nearly 13-fold increase of 1,197%.



Pre-pandemic: Australia, China, Japan, New Zealand, India





- U.S. colleges and universities play an important role in ensuring the health and safety of students traveling abroad
- Want more U.S. students to study abroad prior to graduation and in more destinations outside of Europe (a NAFSA advocacy priority)
- Added vaccine cost burden can discourage students from choosing study abroad or certain destinations

Example: Ghana



- Pre-pandemic (AY 2018-19): 2,000+ U.S. students
 - Africa: #2 destination behind South Africa
 - Yellow Fever vaccine required for entry (among others); on ACIP list of recommended vaccines
 - Cost: ~\$200
- Covering vaccine costs will help increase access to and equity in study abroad
